

HOPE IN THE HILLS:

RAPID CITY CAMPUS TAKES SHAPE



Hope consists of a goal, a pathway leading to the goal, and the willpower to achieve the goal.

Our **goal** for the new Children's Home Society (CHS) Rapid City Campus is to better serve children and families.

The **pathway** is the renovation of the former National American University building on Mount Rushmore Road and relocation of all our Black Hills services at this location.

The **willpower** is our steadfast determination to make this transformation successful through planning, partnerships and fundraising.

Construction has begun on the new Rapid City Campus, transforming the 100,000-square-foot National American University (NAU) building into CHS's new West River home.

"We have made a commitment—a promise—to care for children and families impacted by trauma," said CHS President and CEO Michelle Lavallee.

"But change happens quickly and we must prepare for, and help create, the future of child welfare and family stability. By increasing efficiencies and offering a true continuum of care at a single, convenient location, we are ready for whatever's next," she added.

All Black Hills programs and services will be located at the new campus, resulting in tremendous synergies and economies of scale. CHS will be more accessible for families, staff, visiting care providers, partners and multi-disciplinary team members.

In addition, the space is large and versatile enough to accommodate the inevitable changes that Michelle references.

"We're now very well
positioned in Rapid City to
provide the services needed
in the community today and
tomorrow," said Michelle.

ENVISIONING THE NEW CAMPUS

When the campus is complete, children, families, professionals and partners will immediately feel welcome at the campus. Its natural setting, with green spaces, trees and vistas of the Black Hills, creates a calm and peaceful feeling. In addition to the 12-acre NAU site, CHS purchased 17 adjacent acres to allow for future expansion and to preserve the inspirational, healing environment at the previous Rockerville location.

Sustainable and natural materials such as wood, stone and glass will transform the current facility into a warm and welcoming space of care, healing and renewal.

HALLMARKS WILL INCLUDE:

IDENTITY

Renovating the facility will include expressing its identity, purpose and brand to the public.

WAYFINDING

Clear entry points and signage, along with intuitive layouts, will create a calm and welcoming experience for visitors.

FLEXIBILITY

Rooms, lighting, and furniture will be flexible, to allow for customizing spaces when needed.

As design work progresses, features will be finalized; these are preliminary plans:



OUTDOORS:

- · State-of-the-art security systems
- · Walking paths
- Playgrounds
- Gardens
- Benches and terraces
- Meditation spaces
- · Outdoor recreation facilities
- · Ample parking and lighting



INDOORS:

- · 32 beds for residential treatment
- 64 spots at Owen School reserved for day students from Rapid City and other area communities
- Library, art room and music rooms in the school
- · Gym and recreational facilities
- Sensory rooms
- Conference and meeting rooms
- · Full commercial kitchen and dining hall
- · Artwork throughout the buildings

IN THE MEANTIME

Many CHS services have relocated to the new building, including Outpatient Mental Health Services, Children's Home Child Advocacy Center, Prevention, Training and Education, and Therapeutic Foster Care and Adoption Services. Foundation offices are also in the Mount Rushmore Road facility.

"Already we're hearing from clients and staff how much they like our new location," said Rapid City-based VP of Development Kara Flynn.

For several months before construction began, Kara gave tours of the new facility. "When walking through the building, even though it will be renovated, everyone could see the potential that the space offers," she said.

"It's inspiring to think about the possibilities," said Kara. "And it does offer hope that we can help more children and families heal and achieve stability in a multitude of ways."



19 YEARS OF DEDICATION

He proposed broadening the event by bringing in additional artists, with the idea to both increase the proceeds to benefit CHS and to create greater awareness of the CHS mission. 
DENNY MCKAY EVENT AUCTIONEER

Richard's influence continued to expand the event by the inclusion of his adult students known as Dick's Chicks in the auction. After Richard's untimely passing in 2014, Dick's Chicks have honored his legacy by continuing to support the event with their art, energy and enthusiasm. Again this year Dick's Chicks will host a Dream Team experience for children at Black Hills Children's Home. Through this group of talented women, we are reminded of Richard's great talent, generosity and compelling wit.



DICK'S CHICKS: RICHARD'S ARTISTIC LEGACY CONTINUES

Dick's Chicks is a group of 12 women who took weekly classes from the well-known watercolor artist, Richard DuBois. The group began painting with Richard in 2007 at a workshop he taught in Custer. After the workshop ended, Richard agreed to continue with the classes for a short time. That "short time" turned into regular art sessions until Richard's death in 2014.

Originally, the Dick's Chicks group consisted of five women but grew to 12 over the years. The ladies treasure pleasurable memories of the 1,200 fun and engaging hours learning from Richard. He was a mentor, an advocate and a friend. The group dubbed themselves Dick's Chicks out of reverence for Richard. After Richard's passing, the Chicks have continued helping each other in the artistic journey that began with Richard.

The Dream Team Program was the brainchild of Richard and Rose DuBois. They graciously hosted children in their home studio for six years and inspired many budding artists. Dick's Chicks serve as Dream Team mentors for kids from Black Hills Children's Home. They carry on Richard's mission to create, teach and inspire art.



He never missed an opportunity to host the children in his studio, help them explore their talent and imagination, and treat them to art kits and pizza. Richard brought out the best in those who knew him. His memory will live on through his art and in the art and hearts of all those he touched during his time on this earth.

2025 DREAM TEAM EXPERIENCES AT BLACK HILLS CHILDREN'S HOME

To better connect live auction artists with the mission of Children's Home Society, the late artist and professor, Richard DuBois, and his wife, Rose DuBois, suggested the idea of the Dream Team. The Dream Team program allows artists to work with small groups of children living at Black Hills Children's Home to teach, encourage and mentor the children in creating their own art. Richard and Rose were the first to host the children in their studio. For six years they continued that tradition complete with pizza and art kits for each child!

The Dream Team experience has given CHS children a healthy, positive outlet to deal with their emotions and past trauma while they heal. The children keep their creations, but these photographs are a glimpse into the experiences. Many children have been inspired to pursue art as a hobby, a tool to deal with stress and possibly a career.

I worked in the glass business and took my camera everywhere I went, photographing the Badlands, Pine Ridge and Rosebud Reservations, Devils Tower and the Black Hills. In 1991, I chose to leave the glass business and devote myself to full-time photography. Photography has taken me to Ecuador, Scotland and Alaska. I was the Rapid City Rush Hockey official photographer for more than 10 years. In 2018, I was invited to photograph the HALO for Freedom Project in Dallas-Fort Worth. I spent five days with 44 veterans and Wounded Warriors, most of whom were Purple Heart recipients.

In addition to photography, I do digital imaging to create postcards, brochures, billboards, magazines and books. I have the cover photo and 68 images in *America 24/7*, South Dakota edition, and produced my own book called *Tatanka*, *Four Seasons of Custer State Park*.

By sharing my photography, I hope to teach respect for our natural resources and the importance of wildlife to our well-being.

Jennifer is made of wool and cotton and is named in honor of Lakota artist, Jennifer White, who has been a mentor and inspiration to me.




I am a contemporary Black Hills artist who likes to push the boundaries of various mediums. I add texture, fabric, sewing and collages to many of my paintings.

I am a retired art teacher and taught high school art for 35 years. I am an active member of the Northern Plains Watercolor Society. Watercolor is my main art medium. I have won several awards at the annual "Celebration of Light" at the Dahl Fine Arts Center in Rapid City.

It is an honor to be part of the Jon Crane Children's Home Society Benefit Auction. It is also extremely fulfilling to offer painting lessons to children at Black Hills Children's Home through the Dream Team experience each year. (See Dick's Chicks and Dream Team information on pages 8-9.)

In past years my paintings were inspired by my travels. Two years ago I painted River Bear from Alaska and last year I submitted Winter Wolf from Yellowstone. This year I found inspiration in my own backyard. I love owls and there are great horned owls that reside right behind my house. One day I stalked an owl for several hours to get a good photo of him.

The mandala that is painted behind the owl is part of my quest to find my own artistic voice. After teaching the children at Black Hills Children's Home how to paint mandalas, I decided to paint one behind the owl.

I must confess the main driving force behind my first artistic endeavors was an overwhelming desire to provide my wife with 'local art.' I did this not so much out of the joy of creating my art, but more so for the pleasure of saving our finances. Fortunately, the walls of our home are now filled with my own watercolor prints and watercolor originals my wife has recently created. Consequently, at this point in my life, I can really focus on creating art for charity events in the community which brings us to this year's auction. I am grateful to the event committee, because in spite of my very sketchy qualifications, they let me participate. This is unbelievably the 12th time I've had the opportunity to help raise funds for Children's Home Society with my artwork.

My watercolor is a scene inspired by the Black Hills Children's Home (BHCH) campus on South Rockerville Road. BHCH is located at what was originally Broken Arrow Ranch previously owned by Fred and Gladys Brown. To my surprise, I was recently informed by my 95-year-old uncle, that my grandfather and his business partner were hired by the Browns. They used horses to skid logs from Battle Creek to Broken Arrow Ranch. They skinned logs to be used in the construction of the ranch. The Browns' residence was eventually converted into the first BHCH facility, named Tully House in honor of Fred Tully, the Society's clinical director. The building was, as one observer put it, "the acorn from which a giant oak grew."—HOPE!

I started to draw the landscapes and clouds as a reminder of home. Something just clicked, not only in my expression, but with collectors and galleries. Their response was unexpected, but welcome as I started sending work back home to galleries for exhibits.

When I returned to South Dakota, I reached out to master beader Molina Parker. I've always been fascinated by the art form of beading. Molina initially taught me basic beading techniques. With her guidance, my beaded cloud cuffs are in demand across the country and even around the world.

I am Oglala Lakota and a master ledger artist following in the footsteps of my forefathers. I rekindle ledger art with striking images that capture the unique Lakota way of life.


I was born in Pine Ridge and completed my formal art training at the Institute of American Indian Art in Santa Fe, New Mexico. I interned under noted artist, Oscar Howe, at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, and the late Herman Red Elk was a close personal friend and mentor.

I continue to refine my skills and participate in many local art shows as well as prestigious art shows nationally. My work spans the globe with numerous awards and commissions and pieces in many private and public collections. I am also an author/illustrator of children's books. In 2014, *Tasunka: A Lakota Horse Legend* was published and is the winner of four national awards: Mom's Choice Award, Moonbeam Award, Aesop Award and the coveted Western Writers of America 2015 Silver Spur Award. In 2017, my second book, *Muskrat and Skunk: Sinkpe nu Maka, A Lakota Drum Story*, was published.

In 2014, I was inducted into the South Dakota Hall of Fame. In November of 2021, I was awarded the Western American Award for Lifetime Achievement from The Center for Western Studies at Augustana University, and in December 2021, I received the first Living Treasure Award of the Lakota Nation through the Lakota Nation Invitational (LNI) in Rapid City. In 2024, South Dakota State University presented me with an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

When I was in my twenties, my mother, who was also an artist, introduced me to watercolor. I fell in love with watercolor and to this day, it is my favorite medium to create art.

My original watercolor is titled *Board of Inquiry*. Adult male bison live alone or with other males in a bachelor herd. Dominant hierarchies within the male groups remain evident throughout the year. The three bulls in the painting looked like the leaders of the herd judging all of the other bison. They were in charge just like the chief executive officers of a business.

To add interest to the piece, I created arrowheads into the design of the painting. These arrowheads are raised with texture to add more interest and draw viewers closer.



A native of South Dakota, I grew up in the foothills around Rapid City. An automotive machinist by trade, I started building furniture in the early 1980s. It wasn't until a visit to a Santa Fe gallery in the mid '90s that my attention was drawn to the lathe as a new avenue of artistic expression. Unlike the potter who builds up a vessel with clay, I reverse the process, revealing the art within a piece of wood by peeling away layers a bit at a time. Mastering the lathe is not an easy task, but the journey there is infinitely compelling.

Cherry Delight is made of cherry wood from Tennessee with brass inlay. The lid on this piece is spalted maple burl with brass inlay.

RICHARD DUBOIS


A native of the Black Hills, Richard DuBois (1941-2014) preferred traditional watercolor as his favorite medium. He attended the University of Wyoming, earned a master's degree in art and continued post-graduate studies at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. Richard taught art at Black Hills State University (BHSU) from 1969 until his death in 2014. He also maintained a private studio and home in Rapid City.

Richard was the co-founder of the Northern Plains Watercolor Society and served on the Board of Directors. In addition to his studio work, he conducted many watercolor workshops.

Throughout his career, Richard received numerous awards, including the Rapid City Chamber Award for Liberal Arts in 2004, BHSU's Alumni Association 2005 Excellence in Education Award, Spearfish High School Fine Arts Outstanding Alumni Award in 2007, The Allied Arts Fund "Heart for the Arts Award" in 2009, and many Gold, Silver and Bronze Medal Awards in the Northern Plains.

Richard's legacy is all the art he continues to inspire in the world through the college students he taught and the private lessons he offered to groups like Dick's Chicks.

Melissa Wood is one of the Dick's Chicks. She says, "Richard was a wonderful mentor and a very dear friend. He was very generous with his knowledge of watercolor. He shared his painting process with enthusiasm, encouragement and a big dose of humor! Richard was a prolific painter and very well known in our area. His impact on the art community was immeasurable and left a legacy throughout Western South Dakota. His impact on me as an artist was profound and led me to open my own watercolor gallery. I think of him often when I paint and feel all the people he taught are carrying on his legacy by sharing a love of watercolor. He is greatly missed, but his light shines through the paintings his past students are creating. It was an honor to paint with Richard DuBois."





About his original:

Jon created *A Whisper of the Past* in transparent watercolor. It is a snowy scene of several historic buildings in Rockerville, South Dakota.







Fresh out of the Air Force in 1976, Jon Crane made a radical decision. Rather than make a career out of flying a plane, he chose to make a career out of painting. His goal was simple. He set out to find and paint beautiful places such as country churches, abandoned barns, glistening trout streams and dilapidated mines.

His favorite subjects are wild and nostalgic. Jon's renderings are detailed and honest. His chosen medium is transparent watercolor.


Hundreds of paintings later, many of those beautiful places have changed or disappeared. Though his goal remains much the same, his work has taken on a new, more urgent dimension. His detailed and sensitive watercolors document and commemorate the changing rural American landscape.

He stubbornly continues to search out those vanishing remnants of history to preserve them on paper. His wife, Gail, likes to refer to him as a pictorial historian. In 2015, Jon received the South Dakota Governor's Award for Distinction in Creative Achievement. In 2021, Jon was inducted into the South Dakota Hall of Fame.



The Science of Hope is a theory, a framework and a movement.

More than 2,000 published research studies show that hope is one of the strongest predictors of well-being for children, adults and families.

Hope defined

Hope is the belief that your future will be better than today, and you have the power to make it so. ??*

This is how hope is defined within the Science of Hope. It's not just wishful thinking; it's the future expectation that we can set and pursue desired goals.

Defined in this way, the basis of hope consists of three pillars.

- 1. Goals
- 2. Pathways, for pursuing goals and overcoming obstacles
- 3. Willpower, or agency the ability to direct attention on pathways to desired goals

The Science of Hope is surprisingly simple. It's an established protective factor, valuable for trauma survivors in particular. It complements our current models and modalities of care. And it can be benchmarked and measured.
