### CHS Launches Prevention, Education & Training Initiative

For many people, the latest and greatest "go-to" resource is a voice on their smartphone known as "Siri." So what would be Siri's response to the question, "Siri, how can we prevent child abuse?"

Odds are, the question would prompt a referral to a number of websites with information about child abuse. One thing is certain—there are no easy or quick answers—even for Siri!

Since 1893, Children's Home Society's legacy has been the protection of children and the rescue of childhoods. CHS co-founders William and Elizabeth Sherrard even helped draft the first child protection laws for the state of South Dakota. And over the past 50 years, CHS has developed many excellent treatment programs to help children in crisis.

But a question likely asked at countless CHS staff and board meetings held throughout its 121-year history still remains: "What can we do to *prevent* child abuse?"

During an extensive strategic planning session in 2013, CHS leadership decided the time had come to devote collective wisdom and resources to the prevention of child abuse and domestic violence in South Dakota, and has made the creation of the CHS Prevention, Education, & Training Initiative (The Initiative) a top priority.

Upon learning of The Initiative, a long-time CHS friend, Helen Madsen, became excited about what this could mean for children and families, and she went to the Sioux Falls Area Community Foundation to make arrangements for a gift to support it.

Because of Helen, the Community Foundation became aware of The Initiative, and thought CHS might be a candidate for their annual City Blossom award—a \$50,000 grant for projects that address community needs. A proposal was written and submitted, and much to the absolute delight of CHS leadership, the grant was approved! SFACF's City Blossom award will be used primarily to hire professional guidance that will assist CHS leadership staff and key community stakeholders in the development of a strategic plan for this new initiative.

CHS has created a new staff position to lead the development of this program. Deb Moritz has been the Communications Manager for Children's Home Foundation for the past 25 years and, beginning July 1, will step out of that position to become the new Program Coordinator for The Initiative.

"The Initiative is a big step for CHS and our hope is that, through The Initiative, we will help facilitate a significant reduction in cases of child abuse and domestic violence. I know that this effort can't

### Executive Director **Bill Colson**

The passage of time is such a strange phenomenon! When we are children it seems to move so very slowly. We're in a hurry to grow up, learn to ride a bike, be

allowed to stay at home alone, become a teenager, drive a car, and do all the things we envy about those older than us. I even remember thinking about how cool it will be when I can shave my face like dad does! For youngsters, summers seem endless, our friends of a few years seem to have always been a part of our lives, and each day is filed away in our memory as our thoughts turn to the next day and the next adventure. Those were the days!

As I age, instead of the endless summer, I find myself wondering how it could pass so quickly and thinking it can't possibly be winter again so soon. I wake up in the morning contemplating all I have to do that day and, before I know it, the day is gone. As I write this message for the spring/summer *The Children's Friend*, I can't help but think "I just did this!"—when the truth is that I wrote my column last October, more than six months ago! These days I shave nearly every morning and have for about 50 years. Each time I grasp the razor it seems like I just did that, too! That process isn't nearly as cool as I thought it would be all those years ago!

Twenty one years ago, I was honored when asked to join the Board at Children's Home Society. At the time I had no notion that I would join the staff barely six years later or ultimately become a member of the leadership team. It all seems like yesterday. I know my time here will eventually end, even though I want it to be like those childhood summers—never ending!

How does time pass for you if you're a child victimized by abuse and/or neglect? How about a woman subjected to domestic violence? I think it must pass very slowly, no matter the person's age, but in a different way than it did for most of us enjoying those wonderful endless summers. The wonder for them must be about letting the day be over as quickly as possible while hoping for a bit of peacefulness. The days for them must move so very slowly while wanting to be quickly forgotten. Considering that each of us has only so many days before us, this is a terrible and senseless shame!

These are the people who need us, the ones we're charged and privileged to serve. Our commitment needs to be that we will help make as many of their days safe, healthy, and warmly memorable as possible.

CHS has followed this path for 121 years and I believe we've been remarkably successful. Most of our work, however, has been reactive. We've helped countless women, children, and families rebound from abuse, neglect, and domestic violence, and our pledge is to continue doing so. You've learned from this issue of *The Children's Friend* that we now intend to work at reducing those days filled with abuse, neglect and violence by preventing it in the first place through education and training. I'm confident we'll be successful with this initiative, but I also know it can't be successful without support from you who believe in us. Please join us in this important endeavor!

move forward and be effective without expert and dedicated direction. Deb Moritz is, without question, the right person to lead the charge," said Bill Colson, CHS Executive Director.

Knowing that The Initiative must be financially sustainable, Children's Home Foundation is planning a designated endowment as part of the \$10 million "Legacy of Love and Hope" Endowment Campaign. Already begun, this campaign has raised \$2.5 million in pledges and gifts from generous CHS friends such as Helen Madsen.

"We want to send a clear message that child abuse and domestic violence should not be tolerated. Financial sustainability is key to turning that message into a plan of action," says Rick Weber, Children's Home Foundation Development Director.

The challenge drive is on for Children's Home Foundation (CHF) as efforts continue to provide long-term funding stability for Children's

Home Society (CHS). The Legacy of Love & Hope Campaign officially launches in September, and volunteers are being enlisted, unique campaign gatherings are being hosted, and challenge donors are coming forward to help with the current fund-raising effort to secure the future of CHS.

"Our goal is to have a group of donors who will offer a \$5 million challenge and, to date, four challenge donors have committed a total of \$1.7 million," said Rick Weber, CHF Development Director. Many Children's Home Society friends have already donated in response to the challenge, raising an additional \$1 million. To date, a total of \$2.7 million in gifts and pledges have been committed toward the \$10 million goal.

The Board of Directors has established a long-term "numbers" goal to build a fund that can support 25% of the Children's Home Society's annual budget through a 5% distribution from endowment investments. The "heart" goal will ensure every child who needs the care, protection and support of Children's Home Society will receive it, regardless of funding ability. CHS programs extend statewide and serve over 2,000 children each year.

Informational meetings and tours are being hosted at BHCH, SFCH and Children's Inn. We would love to hear from anyone who would

be interested in attending or would like to schedule an individual tour. It is our

hope that CHS friends will come forward to help, in whatever way they are able, with this very important campaign.

### Development Director Rick Weber

I was likely one of millions of people around the world who were mesmerized by the mysterious disappearance of

Malaysia Airlines Flight 370. At the time I'm writing this the 239 passengers and crew members have still not been found. It has been heartbreaking to see the grief and frustration of the family members. Twentyfive countries around the world, including our own, have joined together in an effort to find the plane and hopefully find some answers to what went so terribly wrong. Up to this point around \$50 million has been spent on the search and it could amount to hundreds of millions if the search continues long-term.

This story unfolded at the time when many of us at Children's Home Society have been considering ways we can do something about a different tragedy—the affliction of domestic violence and child abuse in our society—right here in our state and in our communities. According to the Child Welfare League of America, child abuse or neglect impacts over 6 million children, and for the year 2012 it was estimated that this led to over 1,600 deaths. If you think of that continuing number, it would be like the loss of Malaysia Airlines Flight 370 six times a year...year after year after year.

We are not immune to the problem in South Dakota. In FY 2013 there were 4,900 cases of suspected child abuse or neglect that were significant enough to warrant a family assessment and 1,095 children were removed from their homes due to the severity of abuse or neglect.

If Flight 230 is found, it will bring at least some sense of resolution for the family and friends of the victims. It will also be an opportunity to learn what went so horribly wrong, and efforts can be made to prevent the tragedy from happening again. Similarly, at Children's Home Society, we are addressing the ramifications of child abuse.

We know there is much more that can be done to avoid the problems in the first place—and that's why we are working on a new prevention, education and training initiative. We don't claim to have all the answers, and we know it's an immense and daunting challenge. But we are asking you to join us as we work to break the cycle of domestic violence and child abuse. We respectfully ask for your continued support of our work, whether that is toward our new initiative or the many other needs we have to keep the mission and programs of Children's Home Society going strong. Thank you!



### WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU PASS AWAY WITHOUT AN ESTATE PLAN?

A will might cost a minimum of three to four hundred dollars. But the cost of dying intestate, meaning without a will, can easily be more than that sum. Someone who dies intestate must have a court approve the settlement of their estate. This can be very expensive sometimes costing tens of thousands of dollars. Planning today can help save costs and better provide for your family and future.

### **WHY DO YOU NEED A WILL?**

- A will can help you decide who will receive your property.
- You can appoint a guardian for your minor children in your will.
- A will allows you to appoint an executor to administer your estate.
- A will can help reduce taxes for your heirs and your estate.

### WHEN DO YOU NEED TO MAKE CHANGES TO YOUR PLAN?

If you've recently experienced a life changing event such as a marriage, a death in the family or the birth of a child or grandchild, you should consider talking with an attorney to update your estate plan.

### DO YOU NEED A LIVING TRUST?

A living trust operates much like a will but it has several added benefits. A person can transfer assets to the trust and continue to manage property during his or her lifetime. Unlike a will, the provisions of a living trust document remain confidential. When an individual passes away, a living trust typically allows for an estate to be settled in less time than if there is a will. An appointed trustee will pay any debts and make distributions based on the terms of the trust document without the need for court approval.

### DO YOU NEED A HEALTHCARE POWER AND A LIVING WILL?

A durable power of attorney for healthcare allows you to select the person who can make healthcare decisions for you if you are no longer able to care for yourself. The person you select could make decisions for you regarding hospitalization, treatment and second opinions.

Another healthcare related document is a living will, sometimes called an advanced directive. This document helps you make decisions about extraordinary measures, pain management, feeding and nutrition, or other care at the end of your life.



### SFCH School gets Ready to Read as recipient of AT&T and Monsanto Grants

"With a book I can go places without leaving my room... it's just like I'm on an adventure," was one of the responses from a SFCH student who was asked how she would feel if someone gave her new books to read.

Thanks to grant awards from AT&T and the MONSANTO **FUND**, her book adventure will come true. This year SFCH School received grants for \$4,500 and \$10,341 from the two companies that were used to purchase Guided Reading

books and curriculum guides. The first shipment of 3,000 books arrived and more are on the way!

The original goal of the 2013 SFCH Ready Reader project was to update the entire reading program from Pre-K to middle school. The Guided Reading level books were chosen for the new core curriculum.

Building on the success of the initial Ready Reader model, the 2014 Ready Reader 2 will expand the K-2 lower level books. It includes support

materials that match the internationally aligned standards in reading, science, social studies and math for a readingbased curriculum across grade levels and subjects.

An essential goal of the 2014 project is helping students achieve a solid foundation in reading, ultimately so that

upon transition to a public school setting they will thrive and succeed. Teacher training is instrumental in attaining that goal, and 15 teachers attended a graduate level workshop using teaching techniques from the book, Word Nerds: Teaching All Students to Learn and Love Vocabulary. A fall teacher's workshop entitled, The Next Step in Guided Reading, will continue the training and development of new teaching strategies.

The excitement of receiving new books inspired the redesign of an area within the computer lab to house the resources. The new Guided Reading library has become an environment for staff and children to celebrate literacy and welcomes learners to a variety of activities.

"Breakfast Books" is a pre-school day read-aloud event for students and transition staff. Two new volunteers use the space to tutor

students in reading and language acquisition, and therapy dogs have been incorporated in specialized situations to support therapeutic reading experiences.

CHS is grateful to AT&T and the Monsanto Fund for partnering with us in this important literacy based project.
