

FINDING J O IN LIFE!



A single word expresses George Bamsey's appreciation of Children's Home Society—**JOY!** The 29-year-old is writing a book about his life experience, sharing his philosophy that not everyone has a happy story to tell and that forgiveness is the key to healing and finding joy. He believes it's not where you come from in life, but where you want to be.

George recently stopped by Sioux Falls Children's Home to tour the facility that had been his home for several years in the mid-'90s. He presented a gift, carefully selected for its meaning, to CHS Program Director, Sue Williams. The letter art sign, JOY, expresses his gratitude for the work done by dedicated CHS staff.

"Itry to look for the joy in life and be happy," he says. "I'm succeeding at something. I'm able to present myself as sober, sane and happy. I have my freedom and my health. I called CHS today because I'm ready to talk about my past."

Born in 1985 in Bucharest as Georgescü Nedelcü, his past includes time spent in a Romanian orphanage for the first five years of his life. He remembers this place as an institution where physical punishment and neglect occurred on a regular basis. At age 6, his parents took him from

the orphanage and immigrated to Sioux Falls where he attended Franklin Elementary.

George's childhood memories are painful. "I wasn't able to speak English, so kids would tease me and throw rocks at me at school. My parents were abusive, and they used alcohol and drugs regularly. I learned to live on the streets and would often steal things from a neighborhood grocery store to eat," he said. "They (the grocery store owners) knew it was me..."

The landscape of our work at CHS is changing. For many years our residential

beds have been full with waiting lists at both campuses. Almost all children placed with CHS were either in the custody of the state and funded for both residential and education, or they were in the custody of parents eligible for Medicaid and education funded by school districts. That has now evolved into a time of fewer state referrals and fewer parent referrals with education funded. Empty beds are more common and CHS is funding more education through our scholarship program than ever before.

This trend is the result of widespread efforts to serve children in less restrictive environments, preferably at home. While we are supportive of the effort, we know that there is much variation in what types of treatments are needed to keep children safe and in healthy places. Children respond differently, depending on their mental and physical state, as well as what environment they came from. Whether this trend will continue is uncertain. That depends, as it should, on how children and families respond.

Moving forward, our focus will be to evolve in order to meet the needs of those we serve, whatever they may be. Choosing the direction of our evolution poses a significant challenge but we will manage that, too, just as we have many times over our 122-year history.

To facilitate a productive evolution, we must be sure that our partners, stakeholders, and referral sources know what we're up to and what we have to offer in the way of services. This is important not only so that it is known we have beds available in our residential programs, but also that we are working to expand our community based efforts. Our Prevention Initiative is now under way, and to spread the word about all of this, we need to energize our marketing efforts. We have staff and committed friends who know us well, understand our services and have the right contacts in South Dakota and surrounding states. We will work collectively to do what needs to be done.

In the coming months you'll be hearing more from me about our next steps in the evolution of CHS. I'm thankful you're all along for the ride!

George saw his dad for the last time at age 7, when his mother took George and his sister to Children's Inn to flee the domestic violence in their home. Child Protection Services sent George to live in foster care for a year. His foster parents sought

help from CHS to help resolve George's health and emotional issues.

"I couldn't gain weight. At age 9, I weighed about 48 pounds, and Mars Bars were part of my daily diet," he smiles.

His health condition was remedied with antibiotics, but the self-described "troubled child" continued to need help with emotional issues. He was placed at Sioux Falls Children's Home for residential treatment and care.

"They (CHS) taught me there is nothing in this world that can prevent you from becoming the person you want to be."

"CHS was a safe haven for me," said George. "For the first time in my life I wasn't scared. I wasn't worried about food. I only threw tantrums to get attention when I wanted more of that 'good feeling'." George has fond memories of roller skating, fireworks displays and building things with staff members.

Eventually, a loving couple came to visit CHS and adopted George, age 10, in October of 1995. Kim and Jerry Bamsey, who live west of Howard, gave George a new name and a new life on their crop and cattle farm.

"It was great!" George fondly recalls. "Jerry taught me to drive his old F-150 pickup, and I had a new sister, Erica." The Bamseys also adopted Erica.

George wants people to understand that CHS runs much-needed programs for children who are like him. "CHS really teaches kids how to balance their emotions and make the bad in life turn into an attribute of strength...They taught me there is nothing in this world that can prevent you from becoming the person you want to be," he said, "and there's a lot of joy in understanding that."

Established in 1893, CHILDREN'S HOME SOCIETY (CHS) is South Dakota's oldest human services, nonprofit organization. Our mission is to protect, support and enhance the lives of children, women and families. Through a merger in 1998, Children's Inn (founded in 1977 as a domestic violence shelter) became a program of Children's Home Society.

CHS provides emergency shelter, residential treatment & special education, forensic interview & examination centers, foster care & adoption services, and prevention services. In addition to serving victims of child abuse and domestic violence, CHS also partners with caring parents to help children with emotional or behavioral problems.

Orion Classic: Celebrating 20 Years

"Bring your secrets, bring your scars. Bring your glory, all you are. Bring your daylight; bring your dark. Share your silence; and unpack your heart."

This chorus of the popular song "Unpack Your Heart" by Phillip Phillips served as the theme for the 20th Annual Orion Classic, held August 2–3. The words, fitting to the mission of Children's Home Society (CHS), perfectly extend to the generosity of the sponsors, PGA pros and individuals who have and continue to support CHS through this event.

In honor of the the late Mark Amundson, a new logo was unveiled for the 20th anniversary: **Evening for the Kids: Mark Amundson's Legacy of Love & Hope**. Mark's vision was to develop a fundraising event featuring professional golfers, and he led the Orion Classic steering committee for 19 years. This year, over 580 guests attended the Sunday banquet and a new fundraising record was set—netting over \$490,000 to support the programs and services provided by CHS. Unpack your heart, indeed!

Monday's Orion Classic also brought a record number of PGA professionals to the course. Every pro who had attended the Orion Classic in past years was invited to the 20th anniversary celebration. In 2006, four PGA golf professionals played the course: Butch Baird, Graham Marsh, Dave Stockton and Larry Ziegler. The 2015 event featured 18 PGA pros, 29 Champion Pro Am teams and 10 Executive Pro Am teams.

What started as an exhibition tournament and banquet has grown to become a premier fundraising event for CHS. Since its debut in 1996, the Orion Classic has raised nearly \$5.5 million. The support from each sponsor, pro, participant and volunteer is instrumental for the success of this event, and many businesses and individuals have partnered with us throughout the event's history.

In 2016, the Orion Classic will be featured in *Golfers Giving Back—Exceptional Charity Tournaments Coast to Coast,* a book by golf writer Joel Zuckerman that will highlight 75 of the finest charity golf events in the nation.

A Legacy of Love & Hope is a \$10 Million Endowment Campaign that was launched in 2012 to help build a secure future for Children's Home Society. Our vision is to help every child that needs CHS, regardless of funding limitations, and to do more to prevent domestic violence and child abuse.

The CHS budget for FY2015–16 is \$18.6 million, and 17% of that amount needs to come through charitable support. The lasting legacy of this endowment will be to create long-term stability with permanent funding in the form of endowment distributions that are so critical to the future of CHS.

When asked to become more involved in CHS, DeMaris wanted to learn more about the agency. She read *A Century of Love*, a book about the first one hundred years of CHS. She was emotionally struck by the stories of the selfless employees and sacrificial donors.

As a successful business owner and member of other non-profit boards, DeMaris knew the importance of prudent fiscal management, sound strategic planning, and keen leadership, and after observing all three at CHS, she agreed to join the Board in 2014.

DeMaris was ready to invest more of her time, talents and treasure. She is the type of investor/donor who serves as a great model for others:

A WISE Giver...when DeMaris decided to contribute to the CHS endowment campaign, there was no better way than transferring highly appreciated stock to the Children's Home Foundation (CHF). By avoiding the capital gains tax, she could afford to make a larger gift and help more children.

A RESOURCEFUL Giver...DeMaris found a fun way to double her giving pleasure by uniting two of her beloved charities. She is sponsoring a retreat for the staff and kids at BHCH at Lutherans Outdoors in South Dakota's Outlaw Ranch.

Nesheim Fund with a portion of her IRA and estate through a Revocable Trust. For greater cost effective management of the gift, the monies will be pooled with the CHF investments. Each year, CHF will report to the Trustee of DeMaris' Residual Trust to ensure that the gifts are used as intended—to provide annual support, in perpetuity, for the Black Hills programs of CHS.

And always, a **CHEERFUL Giver...** whenever DeMaris is thanked for an act of kindness or gift, a warm smile appears and her eyes well up with tears of joy. And accompanying the joy is hope—the hope that others will be generous and experience the same joy she derives from giving.



A Rich History:

New Board Member Shares Personal Memories of CHS

Laura Johnson and her sister Marcia were toddlers when their grandfather brought them to Children's Home Society (CHS) in 1958. Their aging grandparents did not feel they could appropriately raise two very young children. Having faith in CHS's reputation of caring for the children who were entrusted to them, Laura's grandparents put her and her sister up for adoption, asking only that they be kept together.

Laura remembers feeling scared that first day, but soon those feelings were replaced with an overwhelming sense of comfort and safety. "We weren't just two more children at a facility," recalls Laura. "We were sisters, and that had to be encouraged for us to be as close as we still are today."

Laura and Marcia spent two years with CHS before a childless couple adopted the sisters. In addition to feeling safe, playing and singing with CHS staff fills Laura's memories.

"My adoptive grandmother was an educator, and she was just amazed by the things we knew and how we sang," says Laura. "It was clear that someone worked with us and cared for us."

Laura believes that early care at CHS truly formed the shape of things to come. Not only have the sisters enjoyed

a lifetime of singing, Laura went on to teach music and art for 27 years in the public school system. And Marcia, initially struggling with her own speech, obtained her speech degree and has worked in the public school system and at the VA.

While Laura was teaching, she met CHS staff member and author, Tom Roberts, during a promotional tour of one of his books, written to help raise funds for CHS programs. "It took my breath away!" exclaims Laura of the memories and gratitude for CHS that came rushing back.

Laura immediately decided that she needed to go back to the place she once called home. "It felt so good to visit and see all of the children in such a positive light."

Laura's time with CHS is taking a new point of view now, as she joins the CHS Board of Directors. "It's so hard to put into words, the feelings of the heart," says Laura as she explains the deep-rooted connection she feels for CHS.

"It was my childhood, and CHS staff was my family." Laura is excited for this opportunity to give back to CHS — which has provided her with such wonderful memories. Laura reminds us that we can't lose track of the fact that these children may be lost right now, but they can go on to live productive lives because of the work of CHS.

"It has to make a difference," says Laura. "It made a world of difference to me!"

Strategies for Safety

An Update on the CHS Prevention Initiative

Someone once said, "Footsteps in history aren't made sitting down."

While Children's Home Society (CHS) continues to research and develop an effective action plan for the future of its Prevention, Training and Education Initiative, we are forging ahead with troops on the ground who provide training and education. In addition, we are developing resources to share with others

who are committed to ending the cycle of abuse. You might say there is no grass growing under our feet through these grassroots efforts.

"What If?" Cards

CHS aims to provide effective tools that can be used to help keep South Dakota children safe. Schools and youth-serving organizations throughout the state are anticipating the release of the "What If?" card sets, a talking tool that uses real-life situations to help initiate conversation between children and adults on safety precautions and abuse prevention.

The sets are versioned for ageappropriate topics, which range from secrets and bullying to neglect and abuse.

Prevention, Education and Training To-Date

In 2014, CHS provided 328 educational presentations and training seminars focusing on the prevention of child abuse, neglect and domestic violence. These efforts reached 9,260 individuals!

CHS is on track to surpass those numbers in 2015.
Over 250 presentations and seminars have been provided, reaching 8,500 adults and youth through September.


'Twas The Night Before Christ

The staff at our residential treatment locations work hard to provide opportunities for the children in care so they can experience the joy of giving and making a difference in the world. The "Sole Hope" project filled that criteria.

Children and staff at BHCH participated in a shoe cutting party on Saturday, June 13. Volunteer Jenny Rehorst collected materials and created patterns for the children to cut shoe parts from old denim jeans and plastic poly folders or milk jugs to make into children's size 3 shoes.

The shoe pieces will be mailed to Sole Hope in North Carolina, and then forwarded on to Uganda, Africa, where shoes are a luxury. Children suffer and die from infection and disease caused by Jigger fleas that burrow into bare feet.

Created with re-purposed materials, these shoe parts provide income for the workers who sew them. Sole Hope provides the shoes, education and medical care to children in dire need.

An eight-year-old girl at BHCH summed it up: "It makes my heart smile to help other kids. Every time I put on my own shoes, I will remember I made a difference."
