18 YEARS OF DEDICATION

With a vision of supporting local charities, for many years Jon and Gail Crane hosted painting demonstrations in Jon's Hill City Gallery. At the end of each demonstration, the newly created piece would be auctioned with proceeds benefiting a different charity each year. In 2007, Jon and Gail chose Children's Home Society (CHS) as the recipient. Denny McKay, long-time auctioneer for the demonstration events, had always held CHS in high regard as one of his personal favorite charities. He proposed broadening the event by bringing in additional artists, with the idea to both increase the proceeds to benefit CHS and to create greater awareness of the CHS mission. The Cranes eagerly agreed, and the Jon Crane Benefit Auction for Children's Home Society was born.





DENNY MCKAY EVENT AUCTIONEER

Denny McKay has served as the event auctioneer with his ability to make people laugh, enjoy themselves, and see the true meaning behind the event each year. Many talented artists have donated both artwork and time. The tireless efforts of volunteers make the auction successful. Community participation continues to grow, and many guests have attended year after year to support the needs of the children at CHS.



RICHARD DUBOIS DREAM TEAM CREATOR

Richard's influence continued to expand the event by the inclusion of his adult students known as Dick's Chicks in the auction. After Richard's untimely passing in 2014, Dick's Chicks have honored his legacy by continuing to support the event with their art, energy and enthusiasm. Again this year Dick's Chicks will host a Dream Team experience for children at Black Hills Children's Home. Through this group of talented women, we are reminded of Richard's great talent, generosity and compelling wit.



DICK'S CHICKS: RICHARD'S ARTISTIC LEGACY CONTINUES

Dick's Chicks is a group of 12 women who took weekly classes from the well-known watercolor artist, Richard DuBois. The group began painting with Richard in 2007 at a workshop he taught in Custer. After the workshop ended, Richard agreed to continue with the classes for a short time. That "short time" turned into regular art sessions until Richard's death in 2014.

Originally, the Dick's Chicks group consisted of five women but grew to 12 over the years. The ladies treasure pleasurable memories of the 1,200 fun and engaging hours learning from Richard. He was a mentor, an advocate and a friend. The group dubbed themselves Dick's Chicks out of reverence for Richard. After Richard's passing, the Chicks have continued helping each other in the artistic journey that began with Richard.

The Dream Team Program was the brainchild of Richard and Rose DuBois. They graciously hosted children in their home studio for six years and inspired many budding artists. Dick's Chicks serve as Dream Team mentors for kids from Black Hills Children's Home. They carry on Richard's mission to create, teach and inspire art.

Richard was a good friend to the children at Black Hills Children's Home. He never missed an opportunity to host the children in his studio, help them explore their talent and imagination, and treat them to art kits and pizza. Richard brought out the best in those who knew him. His memory will live on through his art and in the art and hearts of all those he touched during his time on this earth.

2024 DREAM TEAM EXPERIENCES AT BLACK HILLS CHILDREN'S HOME


To better connect live auction artists with the mission of Children's Home Society, the late artist and professor, Richard DuBois, and his wife, Rose DuBois, suggested the idea of the Dream Team. The Dream Team program allows artists to work with small groups of children living at Black Hills Children's Home to teach, encourage and mentor the children in creating their own art. Richard and Rose were the first to host the children in their studio. For six years they continued that tradition complete with pizza and art kits for each child!

The Dream Team experience has given CHS children a healthy, positive outlet to deal with their emotions and past trauma while they heal. The children keep their creations, but these photographs are a glimpse into the experiences. Many children have been inspired to pursue art as a hobby, a tool to deal with stress and possibly a career.

This original is a reminder of the beauty all around us. Sometimes we can find beauty in the least expected place, like in an ordinary drive down the highway.

I am a contemporary Black Hills artist who likes to push the boundaries of various mediums. I add texture, fabric, sewing and collages to many of my paintings.

Mesa Afternoon is a watercolor on YUPO paper, a material that is a plastic substrate. With YUPO paper I let the watercolor paint have its own way until I see a painting emerge. I apply paint and will then set a piece of textured plastic or stencil to the area. I let it dry and then lift the texture piece. Sometimes I even throw dry rice into wet paint and allow it to dry. This painting won the bronze award in the Northern Plains Watercolor Society competition.



I was born in California, but moved to the Black Hills in the early 1990s and have grown to love this area. I am a member of the Navajo Nation. When I graduated from high school, I was offered a scholarship at the Santa Fe Institute of Art. However, life circumstances kept me from taking advantage of this incredible opportunity. Years later after my children were raised, I had an opportunity to renew my artistic dreams by taking local watercolor classes. This is my seventh year participating in the benefit auction.

An outing to Spearfish Park was the inspiration for this painting. I caught sight of this Kaleidoscope Mallard among the cattails. I just couldn't resist turning this beautiful creature standing in the water into a painting with a bit of an abstract twist.



I am a retired art teacher and a professional artist who works in a variety of art media, but my first love is painting in watercolor. I enjoy the spontaneity of watercolor and find myself experimenting and approaching new ways to apply this medium. I am grateful to teach and share watercolor techniques with adults in weekly classes or workshops. I have also had the opportunity to participate in several workshops with professional artists, so I find my art ever evolving.

I have been a charter and signature member of the Northern Plains Watercolor Society (NPWS) for over 25 years. I participate and have been an award winner at the NPWS annual shows. I also am a member of the Dakota Artists Guild and often have work on display at the Fork Real Café.

This original watercolor, *In Decline*, originated from one of my visits to Rockerville. The town earned its name because of the "rockers" who used to separate gold from stream gravel during the gold rush years. There is much nostalgia in these old buildings. The town was once a tourist destination and was reconstructed with some old buildings including false fronts, wooden sidewalks and other relics of mining's past. Sadly, many of those structures are in decline.



I like it when a place has been around long enough that there is a kind of tension between the way it looked and the way it looks now, as well as a tension between the way it looks to whoever handles it and the way it looks to me. Trouble is, the kinds of places I find most appealing keep deteriorating and getting torn down. I have driven by the old grain elevator in Cottonwood, South Dakota, many times. Each time I go by, I wonder if it will be the last time I will see the old structure.

Several artists and photographers have done pieces featuring the Cottonwood elevator. I have done my share of watercolors of the old building. Every time I paint it I put a new spin on the composition. This time I included a "Crane inspired" snowfall by applying liquid latex to the paper before painting. It's always interesting to peel off the latex to reveal the success or failure of the technique. The addition of an *old green truck* really adds to the rustic feel of the piece.

I've donated to the benefit auction every year since 2014. I am grateful for the opportunity to showcase my talent and especially for the chance to help raise funds for the children and families.

I was raised in the island nation of New Zealand. A love of travel and adventure led to a life on a sailing yacht. Years of travel and exposure to the diverse cultures of the Pacific Rim created the desire to paint the fascinating scenes I witnessed. The opportunity came years later when I moved to Rapid City with my husband. I had the good fortune to attend a workshop with well-known local artist, Richard DuBois, which evolved into weekly painting sessions. Under Richard's mentorship, watercolor became my favorite medium (Dick's Chicks, page 6). For me painting is a means of expressing the beauty and emotions of a scene and sharing it with others. My artistic direction continues to evolve; while I enjoy detail, my style allows for expression of mood and movement.

Early French fur traders referred to the North Fork of the Cheyenne River as the Belle Fourche, French for "Beautiful Fork." Today cattle ranchers line the meandering stream. The tree-covered river bottom provides excellent pastures for cattle. In my painting, a lone horseman with his faithful dog moves the herd to pastures along the river.

I grew up on farms in eastern SD, where I learned to respect and study wildlife and their habits. In high school I lived on a farm surrounded by the Sand Lake National Wildlife Refuge north of Aberdeen. The Refuge is where I quit hunting with a gun and picked up a camera.

I worked in the glass business and took my camera everywhere I went, photographing the Badlands, Pine Ridge and Rosebud Reservations, Devils Tower and the Black Hills. In 1991, I chose to leave the glass business and devote myself to full-time photography. Photography has taken me to Ecuador, Scotland and Alaska. I was the Rapid City Rush Hockey official photographer for more than 10 years. In 2018, I was invited to photograph the HALO for Freedom Project in Dallas-Fort Worth. I spent five days with 44 veterans and Wounded Warriors, most of whom were Purple Heart recipients.

In addition to photography, I do digital imaging to create postcards, brochures, billboards, magazines and books. I have the cover photo and 68 images in *America 24/7*, South Dakota edition, and produced my own book called *Tatanka*, *Four Seasons of Custer State Park*.

By sharing my photography, I hope to teach respect for our natural resources and the importance of wildlife to our well-being.

This year we had a male Bald Eagle stay longer than usual. One day in April he tried to hide deep in the pine trees to get out of the rain. He nestled way down in the branches to stay dry, and he wasn't about to leave. This gave me a good chance to get close and photograph him. A couple days later the Osprey drove him out to the prairie.

In addition to this canvas, I am donating a jigsaw puzzle of the cross-eyed look the Eagle gave me.

I am an enrolled member of the Oglala Lakota Tribe and grew up on the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation surrounded by a rich culture of music and art. After obtaining a Bachelor of Arts in Art from Black Hills State University and having my first solo exhibit at Sioux Indian Museum in Rapid City, I moved away to explore other artistic endeavors.

It took leaving South Dakota for me to find a voice in my recent body of works. While pursuing other art opportunities on the east coast, I longed for home and began expressing what I missed. I started to draw the landscapes and clouds as a reminder of home. Something just clicked, not only in my expression, but with collectors and galleries. Their response was unexpected, but welcome as I started sending work back home to galleries for exhibits.

When I returned to South Dakota, I reached out to master beader Molina Parker. I've always been fascinated by the art form of beading. Molina initially taught me basic beading techniques. With her guidance, my beaded cloud cuffs are in demand across the country and even around the world.

My works are currently influenced by the place I am from and the stories of my heritage, which I feel is important for those who are not familiar with Lakota legends and keeping traditions alive.

Sweetgrass is considered a sacred herb. It is used in prayer offerings to attract positive energies. Lakota legend teaches that sweetgrass is the braid of Mother Earth.





I am Oglala Lakota and a master ledger artist following in the footsteps of my forefathers. I rekindle ledger art with striking images that capture the unique Lakota way of life.

I was born in Pine Ridge and completed my formal art training at the Institute of American Indian Art in Santa Fe, New Mexico. I interned under noted artist, Oscar Howe, at the University of South Dakota in Vermillion, and the late Herman Red Elk was a close personal friend and mentor.

I continue to refine my skills and participate in many local art shows as well as prestigious art shows nationally. My work spans the globe with numerous awards and commissions and pieces in many private and public collections. I am also an author/illustrator of children's books. In 2014, *Tasunka: A Lakota Horse Legend* was published and is the winner of four national awards: Mom's Choice Award, Moonbeam Award, Aesop Award and the coveted Western Writers of America 2015 Silver Spur Award. In 2017, my second book, *Muskrat and Skunk: Sinkpe nu Maka, A Lakota Drum Story,* was published.

In 2014, I was inducted into the South Dakota Hall of Fame. In November of 2021, I was awarded the Western American Award for Lifetime Achievement from The Center for Western Studies at Augustana University, and in December 2021, I received the first Living Treasure Award of the Lakota Nation through the Lakota Nation Invitational (LNI) in Rapid City. In 2024, South Dakota State University presented me with an Honorary Degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

Summer Storm is made of Osage orange wood with turquoise inlay on both sides. The wood is very hard and dense and came from the Red River in Louisiana. The natural knot hole is laced with copper wire.



RICHARD DUBOIS


A native of the Black Hills, Richard DuBois (1941-2014) preferred traditional watercolor as his favorite medium. He attended the University of Wyoming, earned a master's degree in art and continued post-graduate studies at the University of Massachusetts in Amherst. Richard taught art at Black Hills State University (BHSU) from 1969 until his death in 2014. He also maintained a private studio and home in Rapid City.

Richard was the co-founder of the Northern Plains Watercolor Society and served on the Board of Directors. In addition to his studio work, he conducted many watercolor workshops.


Throughout his career, Richard received numerous awards, including the Rapid City Chamber Award for Liberal Arts in 2004, BHSU's Alumni Association 2005 Excellence in Education Award, Spearfish High School Fine Arts Outstanding Alumni Award in 2007, The Allied Arts Fund "Heart for the Arts Award" in 2009, and many Gold, Silver and Bronze Medal Awards in the Northern Plains.

Richard's legacy is all the art he continues to inspire in the world through the college students he taught and the private lessons he offered to groups like Dick's Chicks.

Melissa Wood, is one of the Dick's Chicks. She says, "Richard was a wonderful mentor and a very dear friend. He was very generous with his knowledge of watercolor. He shared his painting process with enthusiasm, encouragement and a big dose of humor! Richard was a prolific painter and very well known in our area. His impact on the art community was immeasurable and left a legacy throughout Western South Dakota. His impact on me as an artist was profound and led me to open my own watercolor gallery. I think of him often when I paint and feel all the people he taught are carrying on his legacy by sharing a love of watercolor. He is greatly missed, but his light shines through the paintings his past students are creating. It was an honor to paint with Richard DuBois."








About his original:

This watercolor was inspired by a photograph Jon took 40 years ago. The buildings were on the golf course at the Lead Country Club in the northern Black Hills, and Jon was commissioned to paint them as a summer scene. That first painting hangs in the University of South Dakota School of Law. Jon was inspired to paint these buildings in a winter scene for this auction.







Fresh out of the Air Force in 1976, Jon Crane made a radical decision. Rather than make a career out of flying a plane, he chose to make a career out of painting. His goal was simple. He set out to find and paint beautiful places such as country churches, abandoned barns, glistening trout streams and dilapidated mines.

His favorite subjects are wild and nostalgic. Jon's renderings are detailed and honest. His chosen medium is transparent watercolor.


Hundreds of paintings later, many of those beautiful places have changed or disappeared. Though his goal remains much the same, his work has taken on a new, more urgent dimension. His detailed and sensitive watercolors document and commemorate the changing rural American landscape.

He stubbornly continues to search out those vanishing remnants of history to preserve them on paper. His wife, Gail, likes to refer to him as a pictorial historian. In 2015, Jon received the South Dakota Governor's Award for Distinction in Creative Achievement. In 2021, Jon was inducted into the South Dakota Hall of Fame.

Jon not only has a passion for old things, but for the new as well. Grateful for art education he received during his formative years in school, Jon now feels privileged to be able to give back in a way that benefits children. Jon's desire is to support Children's Home Society programs in whatever capacity is needed, including art and restoring hope to children's lives.
